24	PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

VICE CHAIRMAN LAWRENCE: Good afternoon. Please note that the Board met in Executive Session just prior to this meeting to discuss legal matters.

And thank you all for joining us today.

This year started off with new challenges, but we truly believe better days are ahead. Like most organizations, SEPTA has felt the impact of the Omicron wave, and I want to thank our dedicated workforce for their efforts during these unprecedented challenges.

Throughout the COVID pandemic, SEPTA has been counted on to provide critical access to essential jobs and services. And on behalf of the Board, I would like to thank all of the employees, led by our GM, Leslie Richards, who are making sure our city and region continue to move forward.

The work to ensure this

Authority will be able to support the recovery continues. We are making

progress with hiring new employees, and our efforts to improve service and enhance safety and security are major priorities.

Another factor is the continued and ongoing push for funding. We are having productive conversations with our partners in Harrisburg, and the Federal Bipartisan Infrastructure Law passed by Congress last fall provides increased investment to help address our most critical infrastructure and vehicle replacement needs.

Beyond supporting SEPTA's
mobility mission, safely linking our
communities and connecting people to
work, school, and essential services.
These investments can also serve as a
catalyst for new and transformative
opportunities for disadvantaged minority
and women-owned businesses. And that's
why I am thrilled to announce that SEPTA
will be one of five inaugural signatories
to an exciting initiative that will

strengthen the transportation industry's commitment to contracting with historically underutilized businesses, creating new pathways for businesses to grow and build their communities.

Following the passage of Act 89, this Board took an important step, led by Chairman Deon, by authorizing the application of DBE goals and procedures for all SEPTA procurements greater than \$100,000, regardless of the funding source.

That decision helped provide greater opportunities for small, minority and women-owned businesses participating in SEPTA's capital program, and I am pleased that SEPTA is leading on the national level with the HUB initiative.

And before we move on, I'd like to thank our friend and colleague, Skip Brion for his service to SEPTA. This is Skip's last meeting with the SEPTA Board, and I know I speak for all of us in saying it's been an honor to work with

you. Skip, you have been an important voice as we have worked through unprecedented challenges over the years. Thank you for all that you have done to help make sure we have a transportation system that works for everyone in our region.

MR. BRION: I want to thank everyone here. I have been on SEPTA, off and on since 2001. So, it's been a long ride.

My goal, and I'll talk about it in a few seconds. A little background. Everybody thinks I'm from Chester County, don't you? I was born and raised in Philadelphia. PTC was a lifeline. As an only child with a single mother, whether I went to Kent Movie Theater, the

Philadelphia Library, the museums, the Connie Mack Stadium, rail systems and bus systems was where I went. It didn't matter what you did. You just had some place to go, and you were able to use it.

I moved out to Chester County
when I had a job offer in, when I was in
Villanova Law School, second year, and I
had, knew nothing about it. I asked a
guy, I saw a guy, "How do you get to
Downingtown?"

"Drive out Route 30, you can't miss it."

It was my first time west of
Villanova in my entire life. And, I tell
you that story because Philadelphia was
the golden empire, and it still is, and
there are people in Chester County that
don't go there. You know why? They
can't go there because there is no way
for them to get there by transit because
the people in Coatesville, for the
richest county in Pennsylvania are poor.
My wife spent her life helping them out.

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I spent my life helping them out. on this board 20 years, and I ask for that critical train station to be opened. I've seen numerous groundbreaking. groundbreaking for the station at PennDOT for the PennDOT area of the station and you know what, that's happened over about 15 years, those groundbreakings. Now I'm leaving, and Marian Moskowitz, our chairman of the County Commissioners is coming over. She is a great lady. will be a great board member. She really, and I, share that goal. I would like SEPTA to take a really long hard look at Coatesville. We need the people in Coatesville because they don't have After this last problem with the cars. flood we had last year, ... getting them food, getting them clothing, getting them furniture, and housing, but you know what you couldn't get them? You couldn't get them transportation because all their cars were flooded out, and the insurance company didn't give enough money for a

1 2001 Ford to be replaced.

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I'd like to see the kids from Coatesville or in Paoli, come down in downtown Philadelphia and see what the riches of this city are, and they can't get there. They are stuck in an area, sometimes in Coatesville, that isn't the best in the world.

So, as I leave after all these years, think about what I just said, it isn't for the richest people in Chester County. I was very lucky when I moved out there, and end up becoming somewhat successful. I don't need the train to get to Philadelphia, but the poor people in Coatesville do. I'd like this Board to really take a hard look into that. As you know, because I'm not going to finish with that until it's done. But I would really like to say that in a very emotional and caring way.

So thank you all for what you have done.

Leslie, thank you.

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victims of the Holocaust, and educate ourselves to prevent this type of atrocity from ever occurring again. I want to thank our Diversity Equity and Belonging Council for pulling together a publication that has links for employees and our customers to learn about the Holocaust. We reflect on those lost and carry on their goodness.

On the business side of things, I'm very happy to share some positive news and I truly feel, and you will hear it, that things seem to be heading in a good direction now, in 2022.

First, though, I do want to address the staffing and hiring topics. I want to recognize and thank so many of our workforce for their extra efforts during the Omicron surge. They covered shifts for those who were out sick, and made sure we continued to operate our services.

Omicron did have an impact on our service, but we are taking steps to

1 address it every day.

> As we look forward and begin to rebalance our service to accommodate increased demand, we are working to fill more than 200 vacant positions, roles from driving buses, to customer service.

We have also been rethinking how we recruit, and for the first time ever, SEPTA is using paid advertising for recruitment for operators.

I'm pleased to share that we are getting a lot of applicants. We have been able to restore the size of our training classes with the help of partners, like the West Philadelphia Skills Initiative, and they focus on helping the neighborhood residents find good-paying jobs.

I want to thank Chairman Deon for his support, and Vice Chairman Lawrence in announcing our HUB Initiative or equity infrastructure project. Very proud that we have the first five movers to move that initiative forward.

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initiative will show our commitment to increase the number, size, and scope of contracts going to certified small minority owned businesses in the infrastructure place.

I'd like to report on an event we had with a Congressperson, Mary Gay Scanlon. Earlier this month we hosted the U.S. Congresswoman and we held a press conference at our Snyder Station on the Broad Street Line to celebrate the passage of Infrastructure and Investment and Jobs Act. The passage of the federal bill means SEPTA will receive an additional \$100 million in capital funding annually for the next four years. This increase in capital funding empowers SEPTA to make significant progress on over \$4 billion worth of backlog in our maintenance and vehicle replacement needs.

Representative Scanlon visited both Snyder Station and our Woodland Shop where the Route 15 PCC trolleys are

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currently undergoing restoration. The Congresswoman remarked how incredible it was to see the behind-the-scenes work that keeps our transit system running.

On our Safety Security Plan I'd like to provide an update. We made significant progress on our 10-point plan. That progress focuses on enhancing the network of people who are looking out for our customers and fellow employees, and giving them the tools to reach out quickly with our transit police:

We are expanding our security guard concept to create a "Guide Program" where guards will serve as additional eyes and ears to our own Transit Police, moving between stations, and riding trains on the Market-Frankford and Broad Street Line.

We expect that the Board will vote on this plan next month, and we could have the guards start as early as March 1st.

SEPTA is increasing the number

of social service specialists from seven to more than 50, to help with the outreach to our vulnerable population:

We are also equipping our social service specialists with police radios to enable direct communication with our transit police.

By early next week, every one of the approximate 250 Subway/Elevated

Maintenance Custodians will have a SEPTA cell phone to enable direct communication with Transit Police dispatch.

SEPTA is looking to expand our Transit Police Department, and we've set a goal of adding 20 police hires to our summer class.

We have deepened our partnership with Women Organized Against Rape to identify ways to ensure the safety of our riders through education and training.

And we will continue to promote our TransitWatch app and other ways to report a crime or dangerous situation, and educate the public on the various

ways to call for help on our system.

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We're also using our YouTube channel to seek the public's help in identifying unknown suspects.

I would like to take time right now to recognize some of our extremely valuable employees and these are members of our Transit Police. Of course, the backbone of our entire SEPTA security is our own Transit Police who bravely do their job every day, often putting their own lives on the line. I want to recognize four officers in particular today, who did just that:

On December 2nd, 2021, SEPTA

Transit Police Officers William Barch and Christopher Stokes were on a detail which meets each, which meets each Market

Frankford bus arriving at the 69th Street

Terminal. The officers heard gunfire in the surrounding area and responded to the scene. The suspect began shooting at the officers who were ultimately able to arrest the man and recover his gun. That

1 man was charged in the shooting of two 2 people during the incident, one fatally.

Thankfully, the officers were uninjured in the incident.

I believe the officers are with us today, if they want to come forward.

Police Officers Barch and Officer Stokes.

GM/CEO RICHARDS: Thank you so much. Thank you so much for all that you do. We are so grateful you were uninjured as you did this lifesaving work. And we truly appreciate it. And thanks for being here with us today.

In a separate incident on

December 15th, SEPTA Transit Police

detectives Anthony Michetti and Anthony

Lederer were driving on the 3100 block of

Kensington Avenue, when they ed a

fatal shooting. The detectives

confronted the suspect, demanding that he

surrender. Instead, the suspect began

firing at the detectives. A gun battle

ensued, and the suspect was wounded and

apprehended. Fortunately, our officers were uninjured, and I believe these officers are with us as well today.

Please come forward, again, Officer

Michetti -- Detectives Michetti and

Lederer.

APPLAUSE

GM/CEO RICHARDS: While neither of these incidents occurred on the SEPTA system, they highlight the partnership our officers have with the Philadelphia Police Department, and the support that we provide to all the police jurisdictions in our service area. It's truly important that we highlight incidents like these and recognize our heroes. I'm very grateful to our SEPTA Transit Police. I know we all are. And thank you for allowing us to show our appreciation. Thanks for all you do.

Next, I want to talk about human trafficking month, which is January.

January marks Human Trafficking Awareness Month, and SEPTA is proud to be one of

the leading transportation agencies working to prevent this awful crime.

Human trafficking affects every city, suburb, and rural area in the United States, as traffickers claim more than 25 million victims globally, and generate billions annually.

Every frontline SEPTA employee has been trained to recognize the characteristics of trafficking and our Transit Police officers have received special training from the Villanova Law Institute to identify and investigate human trafficking and address commercial exploitation.

Please do your part to recognize the red flags such as someone looking fearful or traveling with minimal or inappropriate luggage or clothing. If you see something, please say something.

And remember our TransitWatch

app is there, and our police officers are

ready, and our teams are there to assist.
